SINCE 2007 APTC has graduated more than 2800 students, opening doors of opportunity in a number of businesses throughout the region.

Most of you have received either a Certificate III or IV or Diploma that has qualified you to Australian standards. Yet 98% of you and your fellow graduates have opted to remain and contribute to the economy of your island countries.

You are fulfilling a goal set by APTC since its beginning, to help fill the shortage of skilled labour in Pacific Island Forum countries.

But now you have another role to play.

As graduates, if you have not already done so, you are now eligible to become a member of the Alumni Chapter in your country.

APTC General Manager, Antoine Barnaart reminds graduates that as Alumni, "you will always be a part of APTC: you take not only your certificates but also the future reputation of the College.



Nearly half the total graduates of APTC have now registered as Alumni in their island countries. And more are set to join. A significant number of these students from a recent graduation in Samoa have already expressed interest in being a part of their Samoan Alumni Chapter.

"I know that you will accept this responsibility seriously and not only be good ambassadors for the

APTC but also strong leaders in your industry and communities," said Mr Barnaart.

THE full agenda of guest speakers at the inaugural meeting of the Solomon Islands Alumni was indicative of the wide-ranging interests of the newly formed Chapter.

The Committee wishes to develop relationships and involvement with community services stakeholders and activities. Potential partner organisations are being identified, and a letter to initiate meetings is being drafted.

EFFICIENT communication is a priority of the newly formed Santo Alumni Chapter. Each hotel and resort that employs APTC graduates has a representative on the Executive Committee. The members agree that this makes for the speedy dissemination of information, and helps foster closeness within the Chapter.

The March APTC graduation ceremony on Santo, a northern Vanuatu island, saw 29 enthusiastic new members join the Chapter and receive their Alumni t-shirts.

TO underscore the enthusiasm of graduates towards joining their Alumni Chapters, none is more evident than in Fiji.

To date, 847 students have graduated from APTC, of those, 570 have registered as Alumni.

To accommodate these numbers, three Alumni Chapters have been organised, one in Labasa on Fiji's second largest island, and two on its main island, Viti Levu, in the nation's capital Suva, and in Lautoka. The second meeting will address the official setting up of the Chapters, according to Amelia Kanalagi, APTC College Alumni Officer.
